Samuel Taylor Of Perquimans

A Samuel Taylor was in Perquimans Precinct witnessing deeds as early as Jan 1712/13.

He was deceased by 13 Feb 1739 when his son William Taylor sold 150 acres "willed to my father **Samuel Taylor**." He may have been that **Samuel Taylor** who was a brother of Rev. Ebenezer Taylor, early churchman in North Carolina. In his will made in 1711, Rev. Ebenezer Taylor named brothers **Samuel Taylor** and Benjamin Taylor (and their 'children' but no names), his brother Edward Walker (and 'children'), and his cousins Samuel and Elenor Cross (and their children). He also named his 'son-in-law' Gowen London, which seems to have meant 'nephew.' 1

One child of **Samuel Taylor** has been identified:

1. **William Taylor** of County of Bath, Precinct of Carteret in 1739, md. Abigail (she md. [2] Samuel Whitehouse), and d. c. 1749 in Carteret. *At least one child:* William Wilkins Taylor, md. Elizabeth Shepard (dau. of David Shepard), and d. *bef.* 1779.²

On 13 Feb 1739, William Taylor, Planter, for 110 pounds paid by Joshua Long of Perquimans, Gent., 150 acres by the Mill Pond on the line of Daniel Hall and said Joshua, land willed to my father Samuel Taylor.³ William Taylor was granted 200 acres in Carteret County on 4 Aug 1741 on the Northeast side of White Oak River, joining John Roberts and the river.⁴ On 5 Sep 1749 in Carteret, Abigail Taylor, widow of William Taylor, dec'd, was granted administration on her husband's estate, bond 25 pounds.⁵ William and Abigail Taylor seem to have been the parents of a William Wilkins Taylor (see separate paper). Another William Taylor was dec'd. in Carteret in May 1803, Sarah Taylor, admx.⁶

Involved in a Deed Transaction in Jan 1712/13

Samuel Taylor was in some way involved in a land transaction in Perquimans in Jan 1712/13.⁷

13 Jan 1712/13. We the subscribers do make over this within deed of sale unto Thomas Blitchenden his heirs or assigns with Warrenty. John (W) Norcom, Samuel Taylor. Ackd. 13 Jany 1712/13. Test: Richard Learey, Clk. Regtd. 14 Jany. 1712/13 pr. John Stepney, Regr.

Witnesses Sarah Long to Jonathan Taylor Deed in Apr 1717

Samuel Taylor witnessed with Richard Leary in Apr 1717 when Sarah Long deeded 184 acres to Jonathan Taylor.⁸

6 Apr 1717. Sarah Long, Widow, Perquimans Prect to Jonathan Taylor, same, 20 pounds N.C. a plantation of 184 acres lying in ye Prect. afsd bounding on ye land where the said Sarah Long now Doth live & on ye Western Side of Indian Creek & the land of Henry Cogdell commonly Called the Old field or Howsoever otherwise bounded ... Wit: Samll.

Tayler, John Stepney. Ackd. 9 Apr 1717. Richd. Leary, Cl. Co. Regtd. 11 Apr 1717 pr John Stepney.

Samuel Taylor Witnessed Deed Back to Sarah Long for Life

Samuel Taylor and Richard Leary witnessed on 9 Apr 1717 when Jonathan Taylor deeded 220 acres to Sarah Long during her lifetime.⁹

9 Apr 1717. Jonathan Taylor, Perquimans Precinct, to Sarah Long, same, Widow, for love & affection & for 19# N.C., all my plantation lying at ye Mouth of ye Indian Creek which I Purchased of ye said Sarah Long, 220 acres ... unto the said Sarah Long for & During the time of her Natural life & at the Decease of the said Sarah Long, these Presents are to be Void & of none Effect & said Jonathan Tayler Be Invested with the fee simple of the afore Bargained Premises ... As if this Presents Writing never had Been ... Wit: Samll. Tayler, Richd. Leary. Ackd. 9 Apr 1717. Richd. Leary, Cl. Co. Regtd. 11 Apr 1717 pr John Stepney. 10
